DKE House Capital Campaign

There is still time to participate in the capital campaign. While the formal campaign is over, the plaque listing all donors has not been finalized. Currently, there are 915 living DKEs, and 522 have participated in the capital campaign. The brothers and house corporation are working very hard to protect the finest house on campus.

DKE Professorship/Carolina First Campaign

The DKE professorship is \$50,000 short of the required goal to get into the legislature for matching-funds consideration. For an endowed professorship in the college of arts and sciences, which is \$1 million, the N.C. legislature will match 50 cents on the dollar at \$666,000. We are hopeful to reach our goal by the upcoming legislative session.

The DKE house is the first fraternity/sorority house on campus and, perhaps in the nation, to fund an endowed professorship. Following the DKE lead, the Phi Delts are working on a professorship, and we hear several other houses are very interested.

The DKE professorship is in conjunction with The Carolina First Campaign, the university's \$1.5 billion campaign. All gifts are tax deductible and included in The Carolina First Campaign.

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George Butler '66: A Voyage of Discovery from Britain to Antarctica and Beyond

eorge Tyssen Butler looked the part, from his elephant hair bracelet to a jaunty walk, as he made his way up the DKE house sidewalk for the first time in the early 1960s.

Born in England, raised in Africa and Jamaica, schooled at Groton, George was about to become a member of the DKE class of 1966, one of 24 scrubbed young men in narrow ties, madras sportcoats, white socks and Weejans. Even though the class of '66 was to suffer fairly alarming attrition from too many parties and too little classtime, George and his DKE classmates were to go on to bigger and better things.

In George's case, it was filmmaking. In fact, his latest endeavor, "The Endurance: Shackleton's Legendary Antarctic Expedition," an epic film about fabled English explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton, has taken the entertainment world by storm.

Based on a book of the same title by Caroline Alexander, Butler's film chronicles one of the most amazing feats of modern survival, the travails of Shackleton and his 27-man crew in their failed 22-month attempt to be the first to cross the Antarctic continent on foot beginning in 1914.

Shackleton and his men, including a coterie of sled dogs, set out on the sailing vessel Endurance from England, and almost two years later completed what, by most measures, is the most amazing journey ever undertaken.

Butler and his New York-based production company, White Mountain Films, actually produced the cinematic Shackleton story in two versions: a documentary using much of the original footage and still photos shot by the expedition's photographer, and a 40-minute Imax presentation. Both are playing in theatres around the world to thrilled audiences and four-star reviews.

Some critics have called the film a sure Oscar contender, and it has already won its share of awards, including Best Documentary honors in film festivals from Chicago to Hawaii.

But this isn't Butler's first foray into nonfiction feature films. In 1977, he produced and directed "Pumping Iron," an intriguing story of male bodybuilders featuring a thenunknown Arnold Schwarzenegger. Eight years later, it was the ladies' turn with the bench press in Butler's "Pumping Iron II: The Women."

The filming of "The Endurance" took Butler and his production crews from the British Isles, where they interviewed descendents of the men from the original 1914 expedition, to the Antarctic. Production began in July 1999 and finished with a seven-week stint in Antarctica that ended in March 2000. Traveling on icebreakers, the 20-person Antarctic unit departed from Uruguay, tracing Shackleton's perilous voyage from South Georgia Island to Elephant Island and into the Weddell Sea.

The shoot covered the explorer's voyage to some of the most remote and inhospitable locations on earth. Butler and his crews encountered many of the same conditions that Shackleton did, including blizzards and hurricane-force winds that marooned some of the filmmakers for a time on South Georgia Island.

George recently was heard to remark, "Only the DKE house could have prepared me for Antarctica."

For this purpose, a ground floor storeroom was completely renovated, with a new floor and side paneling. It was furnished through the master work of brothers Shufford, White and Oliver who constructed a walnut bar and trophy case. Hoping for a good basketball season, which normally brings the alumni in flocks, Beta is awaiting early opportunities to show off the new room.

Among other areas of campus activities, Dekes were well represented on the football and soccer fields. Joe Churchill '66 held a tackle spot on the line and Bee Chapman '66 continued his kicking duties. John Loud '67 led the soccer team to a 6-2-1 season with the help of Bronson Van Wyck '67, Tommy White '67, George Butler '66, and next year's co-captain Tom Roberts. Meanwhile, Hap Stewart '66 was elected to the Honor Council.

With a cooler winter in sight (the Farmers Almanac predicted entirely too much snow for Chapel Hill), Beta is settling inside by the fire until Groundhog Day in February. At this time, an awakening animal will stick a sleepy head out to look at its shadow in the temperate seventy-degree air. But then, no wonder it is confused, since most of the prophetic creatures (the ones we know about) migrate each August from Waterville, Maine, and similar points north.

Meet Don Gaddo, New DKE House Director

fter the DKE house renovations were finished, the officers and board members set about the job of finding someone to look after things. After all, protecting a \$2 million investment is serious business.

Meet Don Gaddo, retired president of the U.S. division of Jannock Ltd., a Canadian company. Don, who once also played minor-league baseball with the Milwaukee Braves' farm system, retired from his CEO job in 1995.

He and his wife, Sharon, spent 14 months in Europe, unwinding from a lifetime career in business. "We acted like high school kids. We loved every moment."

Bored with retirement and wanting a taste of college campus life, the Gaddos moved to Chapel Hill in the fall of 1996. Right away, they found themselves thrust into the world of campus Greek affairs. But it was by design. "We thought it would be exciting to become house parents at a sorority, and so we did." The Gaddos took up residence at the Sigma Sigma Sorority.

In 1998 Don was asked to become house director at Alpha Tau Omega, and a few months ago he took on a similar assignment at the DKE house. Since his taking over at ATO, the fraternity has been named one of the top chapters in the nation for three years running. Don, who likes to apply his business experience toward helping Greek members run their houses, says, "I love every moment of my new endeavors."

It didn't take long for Don to put his management experience into play. He found himself a member of the chancellor's committee for Greek affairs and was selected as an honorary member of the National Golden Key Honor Society by the students at UNC. He was also named UNC house director of the year for three years in a row.

But somehow, watching over two fraternities and a sorority and, most recently, helping oversee the UNC Greek system wasn't quite enough. So Don turned to writing. In 1998 he published his first book, and since then he's written two more.

Angel: A Mighty Fortress is the true story of an ill-fated B-17 shot down over Germany during WWII. The plane's navigator was Don's cousin, who died in the crash. The book is now in its fourth printing and has been transformed into a screenplay. Don's second book is titled *The Stained Glass Window*, and was followed by *War's Lost Love Found*. All three deal with the WWII air crew that mysteriously disappeared on July 19, 1944. "The mysteries surrounding the crew, the B-17 Flying Fortress and the families are captivating examples that miracles do exist," Don says. "I have spoken at Airventure, the world's second-largest air show. Only the show in Paris, France, is larger. This year my topic will be American air power."

Sharon and Don have been married for 43 years. They have three children and six grandchildren.

About working with Chapel Hill's Greek community, Don says, "I love working with the young men and women, as does my wife. Although challenging at times, the work is also rewarding beyond one's greatest anticipation. It also keeps me young, engaged and wanting to do more."

Fraternities on "Fragile Ground"

Ver since moving from New York to Chapel Hill in the fall of 1999, I have noticed a growing uneasiness about fraternities at UNC in general. A handful of houses are vacant and boarded up. Many are undergoing renovation, but the work goes slowly, as I expect the fundraising goes slowly as well. The Deke house is handsome and strong, but around it are signs that something is wrong.

When I heard recently that 225 men pledged fraternities last fall but only 165 actually made it through initiation eight weeks later, I and others moved from uneasiness to major concern that the fraternities, as we know them, are in jeopardy.

Even with our spectacularly refurbished Deke house as the best facility on campus by far, our Beta brothers have to work overtime to recruit and maintain a pledge class large enough to be financially self-supporting.

In January of this year, the UNC Board of Trustees, chaired by Deke Tim Burnett '62 and chancellor James Moeser, called the fraternities and sororities to a special Student Affairs Committee meeting to warn the Greeks that the whole system is not living up to the standards of excellence and has to change for the better. Too many complaints from parents and students had reached the trustees, and these could not be ignored. Later a trustee told several of us who attended a second committee meeting that fraternities are "on fragile ground."

Robert Poitras '94, president of the Beta Deke board, joined with Don Gaddo, our new part-time house manager,

to do something to help. I also joined them, and together with an energetic Chi Psi and thoughtful SAE, we were the catalysts for a new group of fraternity alumni.

We have had five meetings, growing in attendance each time so that all social fraternities have joined in and formed the UNC Fraternity Alumni Advisors Committee. It's a long name, but our mission is simple: to help fraternities survive and thrive. Our objectives are to assist the brothers in improving in the areas receiving increased criticism— alcohol abuse, drugs and hazing going far beyond responsible pledge training. We also will staunchly support the fraternities when they merit that support, and we will be working with UNC for the university to step up to do more to nurture this great institution.

We are in the process of formally organizing, being recognized as an official organization by the university, and writing our formal mission statement and bylaws. I have been elected president, and Robert Poitras and Don Gaddo serve on the executive committee. Mike Hoyt '66 is also active on the committee.

We have important work to do. What is gratifying is that the board of trustees, the chancellor, the Office of Greek Affairs and the vice chancellor for student affairs have genuinely welcomed our group to working toward this common goal of a thriving fraternity system at UNC. Everybody considers us the fourth leg of a strong table that supports the Greek system, along with the students themselves, the university and the national Greek organizations.
