Recent Murder of UNC Student Body President, Eve Carson, Causes Alumni Board President to Reflect on Importance of DKE in Our Lives

How Would Your Life Have Been Different Without DKE?

As I sat down to write this report, I realized that I couldn't give a usual update of mundane occurrences from the board's perspective. No, when I began to think about what I needed to say, I realized just how lucky we all are to have this wonderful fraternity in our lives. Personally, my life was forever changed by joining the Beta chapter of DKE at Carolina. Some of my best friends to this day, and hopefully for the rest of my life, were made during my four years as a member of DKE. We went through so much together during that time. We experienced highs and lows. We celebrated athletic victories (especially the 1993 National Championship). We supported each other through family or other personal difficulties. We gained strength through our friendships and our brotherhood, and we wouldn't have done it any other way. Or would we?

Do any of you think what your life would have been like without your association with DKE? Would you have been more proactive on campus? Would you have been more involved as a volunteer with a community organization? Would you have studied harder? Would you have met your wife? Would you have taken that job right out of school? Would you have learned as much, done as much, succeeded as much, loved as much?

You may wonder what has caused this introspection. One name answers that: Eve Carson. Her death on March 5, 2008 had a profound impact on me. It made me sick to my stomach. It made me mad. It made me cry. It made me thankful for all I have and all I have become. I did not know Eve. I had never met her. However, she embodied everything a North

Carolina University student should be. She was proud to be associated with the University, and she did all she could with every minute of every day.

I don't know how you may have reacted, but I am sure that each of you felt a little twinge of pain when you learned of her death. After I got over the shock of this news and ran through the gamut of emotions I spoke of earlier, I thought of the young men of the Beta chapter. They really are outstanding young men. They still have, like Eve did have, their whole lives in front of them. They are what we were at one time in our lives—so much potential and so many experiences ahead of them. That is what

makes Eve's death so hard to swallow. She was a world-changer waiting to happen. I feel that way about the young men of our fine fraternity.

As you read through this edition of *The Lion's Roar*, think about how lucky you are and about the exceptional group of brothers currently residing at 132 South Columbia Street. We are able to reach heights that Eve will never see. We are able to do things that Eve will never do. We are all part of something that is very special. We are members of a brotherhood, then, now, and forever.

Paul Glenn '73 Salutes Delta Kappa Epsilon as a Springboard to Life Lessons and Lasting Friendships

Memories of His Days at DKE House Prompt Greater Involvement from Alumnus

The word “effusive” comes to mind when one hears **Paul Glenn '73** talk about Delta Kappa Epsilon at the University of North Carolina. The fact that his two sons are now active members in the DKE house at Chapel Hill stands as a testament to Paul's love of the place.

“I would, without question, recommend joining Delta Kappa Epsilon to a young man starting college,” Paul says. “It is an invaluable benefit. So, you're not going to get along with everyone, but you will find your niche... Fraternities are a springboard to expanding your horizons and your contacts. They don't limit you. They are an integral part of college life. I'm glad my sons are there.”

Paul's enthusiasm for DKE has been reborn in recent years since his daughter, Dillard, began attending UNC a few years ago. Prior to that, Paul had fallen out of touch with the chapter, if not his brothers, although he always enjoyed returning to the house when he was on campus for football or basketball games.

“When I was in school, I'd come downstairs in the morning on a football weekend, and there would already be people there,” he recalls. “They were in their mid-20s, maybe 30 years old, and they'd be spending their morning at a fraternity house. I'd think to myself, ‘Don't these people have something else to do?’ Now, I understand. Now, I do it.”

At the end of his senior year, though, Paul was ready to move on. He didn't stay for graduation and headed for Nantucket instead. In June of 1973, he moved to Philadelphia to attend the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. “I didn't go back to Chapel Hill for a fair number of years,” he says. He didn't want to be one of those guys showing up at the fraternity house at 9 a.m. on a football Saturday! In a few years, he was living in New York City with a group of Dekes from the class of '71. One of those friends, **Craig Perry '71**, wound up marrying Paul's sister. “I stay in touch with all those guys,” Paul

says, naming **Denney Voss '71**, **Eric Fast '71**, **Beech Watson '71**, **Bob Ives '71** and **Peter Moister '70**.

President of his pledge class, Paul joined Delta Kappa Epsilon because his brother, **Vernon Glenn '72**, was there ahead of him and, “it was a great group of guys and a great location,” he says. “It was a really good deal: central to class, good food, the parties were fun and there were great guys.” Little did he know then that more than 30 years later, these “great guys” would still be his friends. He still talks with many of the Dekes who were in the chapter with him, including **Randy Gray '73**, **Peter DuPont '73** and his roommates: **Jimmy Morton '73**, **Gene Hamer '73**, **John Lynch '73**, **Pepper Hatch '73**, **Chuck Clay '73** and **Stuart Baesel '73**.

“Back in the day, the DKE house was more fun than Animal House, and cleaner,” Paul says, recalling parties and mixers with sororities. But, he also remembers studying hard and playing on some great intramural teams. Deke's also participated in the Heart Fund Drives and other philanthropic activities. “The whole four years were great!” he avers.

It was those happy memories and his children's departures for Chapel Hill that prompted Paul to get involved with DKE again. He joined the alumni board of directors last fall and enjoys the opportunity to advise the actives. “We are working diligently on their behalf,” he says with his tongue firmly in his cheek. He is one of several co-chairs of the Eddie Caldwell Fund, happy to support the

chapter and its members in any way he can.

“Delta Kappa Epsilon has a great history, a great legacy at North Carolina,” Paul explains. “You run into people all over who were Dekes at Chapel Hill, and the vast majority are very proud to say they were there. It's a great way to start a dialog.”

Paul admits that, by far, the greatest benefit of his fraternity membership is the lifelong friendships and connections he made: “Right, wrong or indifferent, life is not what you know, it is who you know.” But, it also was a learning experience: “I learned how to survive, how to navigate and journey through life. You learn a lot of life skills when you're around people from so many different walks of life, with so many different viewpoints.” He thinks the current crop of Dekes is cut from the same cloth; they're bright, motivated and ethical.

Paul now concentrates on work, his family and the DKE house. He and his wife, Sharon, have three children: a daughter, Dillard, who graduated from UNC in May of last year; and two sons, Paul, Jr. and Jim, both of whom are currently Dekes at UNC. Paul has been in the brokerage business for 27 years, beginning his career with E.F. Hutton. He is now a money manager for Wachovia Securities' Private Client Group in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, where he works with **Conrad Graham Jr. '03**.

Having earlier avoided the alumni trap of trying to relive his college days, Paul now thoroughly enjoys his visits to Chapel Hill. In addition to seeing his children, he always takes pleasure in running into fellow Dekes who are stopping by the old DKE House. He noted that during the recent UNC at Duke basketball game, there were 15-20 brothers watching the game at the house, none of whom were undergraduates. It's that secure fellowship that Paul cherishes from his DKE experiences; he's effusive that his sons now have the same opportunities.

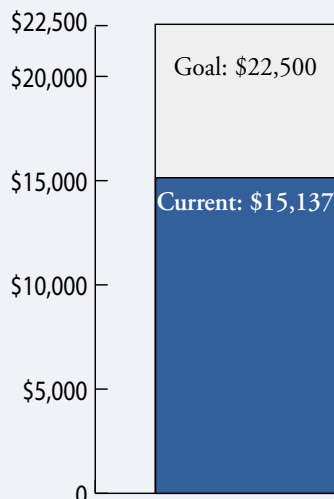
